


Editing Othello

Introduction

William Shakespeare's tragedy Othello is a play that remains highly relevant because of the themes it tackles. These include, but are not limited to, race, gender, jealousy, gender, and sexuality. The goal of this research project was to compile a bibliography that represents the complete history of the play, not only through identifying critical literature, but also through developing performance and illustrative histories. The two resultant bibliographies include all Othello editions, scholarly works, manuscripts and archival materials, illustrations, and film and theatre adaptations. Professor Abdulhamit Arvas will use these bibliographies as part of his larger research project, which is to edit a new edition of the play for Oxford World's Classics.




Methods

Editions

Compiled a list of all published Othello editions since 1900, focusing on those from publishers such as Arden, Cambridge, Oxford, and Norton. These editions often belong to different series, such as The Arden Shakespeare and Arden Performance Editions or The New Cambridge Shakespeare and Cambridge School Shakespeare, that were written for different audiences and uses.

Scholarly Works

Arranged scholarly works by journal articles, reviews, books, and book chapters. These works were then categorized by themes of race, gender/sexuality, motivations/characterization, language, and performance. Additionally, assembled a list of news articles about Othello referenced in popular media. The publication dates of these works range from the 1990's to present.

Manuscripts/Archival Texts

Manuscripts, which are works that are written by hand, are organized by library location. The archival texts selected are rare items that consist of either playbills, commentaries, or even early editions of the text such as the First Folio (1623), a collection of Shakespeare's plays published after his death. These items are also categorized by library location. These items mostly range from the 17th century.


